Assembly OK's Lottery, Senate Seen Uncertain

TRENTON (AP) — Legislation to allow the voters to decide whether New Jersey should operate a lottery has cleared a major hurdle by winning heavy Assembly approval. But it faces an uncertain future in the Senate.

The Assembly voted, 52-15, after some procedural confusion yesterday to place a proposed constitutional amendment paving the way for a

state lottery before the voters in November.

The Assembly vote was more than sufficient—a three-fifths majority of 48 votes was needed—to place the question on the November ballot, if the Senate concurs.

Should the upper house reject the proposal or approve it by less than a three-fifths vote, the state constitution requires that legislative approval

be reaffirmed next year before the issue could go to the voters.

Other Developments
In other major legislative developments yesterday:

—Gov. Richard J. Hughes, acting before Republicans make final policy on bond issue proposals, sent GOP legislative leaders a detailed memorandum contending that \$100 million is the "absolute

bare minimum" that must be bonded for institutions.

—Legislation providing for a \$104 million Medicaid program by 1970 was introduced in the Senate, an amount substantially less than advocated by Hughes.

—A vote on a bill to add 12 days to the thoroughbred racing calendar was postponed until next week.

The Assembly action on the

lottery marked the first time such a proposal has cleared even one house of the legislature. The last time a lottery proposal was brought before either house was in 1967 when it failed in the Senate.

It remained unclear today whether the Assembly-approved lottery proposal would have better luck this time. The governor has frowned on submitting the question to the voters on the same ballot this year with bond issue proposals. But he has not ruled out the idea. The legislation does not need the governor's signature but Hughes could influence many Democratic votes.

Hughes has expressed the fear that the voters might look upon the lottery as "an easy out" preferable to increased state taxes for solving the state's financial needs.

The Hughes administration has estimated that a lottery, which the governor does not oppose in principle, might bring in as much as \$40 million in additional revenue. (See LOTTERY, Pg. 4, Col. 5)

Death Penalty Upheld As Constitutional in Trial

FREEHOLD — Superior Court Judge Clarkson S. Fisher yesterday upheld the constitutionality of the death penalty pending the outcome of a Supreme Court ruling.

The judge also upheld the prosecutor's right to challenge prospective jurors in murder cases concerning their views on capital punishment.

Judge Fisher denied two motions by Marshall Selikoff of Freehold and Robert A. Coogan of Spring Lake Heights, both representing Larry Cagle, 19, of Red Bank.

Cagle has been indicted by the Monmouth County Grand Jury for the murder of Oliver A. Newton Sr. of 54 Liberty

St., Long Branch, last Thanksgiving Eve. Mr. Newton was allegedly attacked by youths when he went out to buy a newspaper, police had reported. He died days after being injured.

Decision Is Cited
In their motion, the attorneys relied on a North Carolina Court of Appeals decision of April, 1967, which reversed a trial court conviction.

The two lawyers also sought to overturn the constitutionality of the New Jersey criminal law concerning the death penalty by using a 1968 Supreme Court decision.

Mr. Selikoff maintained that to permit the prosecutor to

make challenges for cause of prospective jurors bars a defendant from his rights of a fair trial.

Based on the present system, he said, a defendant has a death qualified jury, adding that this created a double standard of inquiry.

Points Made
The North Carolina decision which Mr. Selikoff cited said that the prosecutor was allowed successfully to challenge prospective jurors for cause if they expressed sentiments against capital punishment without additional determination being made that their objections to the death sentence would preclude them from

rendering a fair verdict on the issue of guilt.

On the second point, Mr. Selikoff said that a defendant is deprived of his constitutional rights to have his case tried before a jury or before the court because if it went before a jury, he took his chances. The accused is deprived of his freedom of choice, he continued, adding that he has the right of a trial by jury and that he should have the right to waive this option.

If a defendant did waive his rights, he continued, the court must impose the death sentence because only a jury can give life imprisonment. (See DEATH, Pg. 4, Col. 4)

Crisis in France Gets Worse

PARIS (AP) — France's massive crisis worsened today, with more than one third of the nation's workers on strike, but President Charles de Gaulle's government still did nothing.

The Gaullist governing coalition expressed confidence it would survive a parliamentary vote on a censure motion tomorrow night, but it gave no indication what it would do about the workers' revolt for higher pay, shorter hours and job security.

Nearly six million of the nation's 16 million workers were on strike, 250 factories were idle, and the movement was still growing. And unlike previous French strikes of 24 to 48 hours, no limit was put on these walkouts and sit-ins.

The strikes stopped trains, subways, buses, taxis and garbage collection in Paris and closed coal mines, airports and seaports. Some tourists were stranded. Lines formed at food and tobacco shops, banks and gasoline stations.

Amid a monstrous traffic jam in Paris, made worse by cars that were abandoned after running out of gasoline, few policemen were in sight. Although not on strike, many apparently stayed home.

Facing the gravest threat yet posed to his 10-year-old Fifth Republic, de Gaulle has made no public statement since breaking off a visit to Romania Saturday and returning to the Elysee Palace. He is to

address the nation on television Friday night, and there was no indication of what he planned for a situation strongly reminiscent of the turmoil that brought him back to power in 1958.

Opposition political leaders conferred with trade union leaders yesterday in preparation for their attempt in the National Assembly to oust Premier Georges Pompidou and his Cabinet.

The French Communist party called for an end to the De Gaulle regime and the formation of "a true republican regime opening the way to socialism."

A successful censure motion in Parliament would not oust De Gaulle, whose term runs until 1972, but would be a major setback to his policies.

George Seguy, secretary-general of the big Communist

backed General Confederation of Labor, said in a speech that the striking workers will present their same demands to whatever government is in office until they obtain satisfaction.

The French crisis began with a revolt early this month of university students demanding educational reforms. Despite a promise from Pompidou to meet these demands, the students launched round-the-clock sit-ins at most of France's universities, and last Tuesday night workers spontaneously took up the tactic to push their long-standing demands, beginning with an aircraft factory in Nantes.

Universities remain closed, and high schools in the Paris region joined the strikes Monday, with some teachers remaining on duty only to look

after any pupils that showed up.

A committee claiming to represent the more than 1,000 American students in Paris said it would maintain solidarity "with the movement of French students, teachers and workers."

Eastern France, Alsace and Lorraine were least affected by the strikes so far, but the 25,000 men of the Peugeot auto factory at Sochaux, near the Swiss border, walked out.

The ports of Dunkerque, Le Havre, Bordeaux and Marseille were tied up. Several foreign freighters bound for Marseille with perishable cargo were sent to Genoa, Italy, to unload.

Red flags of revolt flew over most French ships in Le Havre and Marseille. The crews of French freighters due to sail from Le Havre refused to take their ships out.

Airstrips Win Out In Holmdel Battle

HOLMDEL — Airstrips won in a fly-by here last night.

An amendment to the zoning ordinance that would have prohibited "any aviation facilities, public or private," was turned down by the Township Committee by a 3-1 vote. Dissident Committeeman Alfred C. Poole who had introduced the amend-

ment said he did not want to exclude heliports that would be "vital to the community's interests" and that he had made that clear before the meeting.

More than 30 residents attending the four-hour committee meeting voiced their concerns about evenly divided between the public hearing on the airstrip measure and sad sewer tales.

During discussion of the proposed zoning amendment Martin Brilliant of McCampbell Road said his sports car makes more noise than any small airplane, Robert L. Davis of Ardmore Place expressed disbelief that Holmdel would be "backward enough to oppose private airstrips" and Frank Kinsley of Chestnut Ridge Road mused that neighbors of people with the first cars probably had the same complaints as opponents of airstrips.

Mrs. John Brockwell of Spring Valley Drive was the only onlooker to speak in favor of the amendment. She and her husband have brought suit in (See AIRSTRIPS, Pg. 3, Col. 1)

Reds Gain In Italy

ROME (AP) — Despite sizable Communist gains, Premier Aldo Moro's center-left coalition won a smashing 60 per cent of the total vote for Italy's Senate in complete returns today from Italy's general election. Returns for the Chamber of Deputies were running in the same pattern.

The three government parties—Moro's Christian Democrats, the unified Socialists and the Republicans—won a total of 183 of the 315 Senate seats, a gain of four and a comfortable majority of 51 in the upper house.

Moro's chief partners, the unified Socialists, lost ground but the third party in the coalition, the tiny Republican party, doubled its percentage of the vote and won seats in the Senate for the first time.

The Communists' allies, the Moscow-line Proletarian Socialist party, also gained. The conservative Liberals, the Fascists and the Monarchists all lost ground.

Foreigners Have Role In Talks

PARIS (AP) — U.S. officials expect Britain, France and the Soviet Union all to play some part in carrying forward negotiations for peace in Vietnam.

Red China opposes a settlement, but its power to block a deal is believed to have been impaired by Mao Tse-tung's cultural revolution.

A new burst of diplomatic activity in Paris and other capitals focused attention today on the potential roles of other powers with a stake in the outcome but with no current voice in the discussions in Paris.

U.S. Ambassador W. Averell Harriman and Ambassador Xuan Thuy of North Vietnam were to call on President Charles de Gaulle today, Harriman in the morning and Thuy late in the afternoon.

While the visits were listed as courtesy calls, each man was expected to discuss his government's position in the negotiations.

British Foreign Secretary Michael Stewart will fly to Moscow tomorrow to confer with Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko. The two men are co-chairmen of the Indo-Chinese peace machinery created in 1954 and could be instrumental in arranging a peace conference if progress in the Paris talks ever warrants one.

Bids School Emphasize Racial Gains

MATAWAN TOWNSHIP — The Concerned Citizens of Matawan, an interracial group dedicated to the principles espoused by Martin Luther King Jr., last night appealed to the Matawan Regional School board for curriculum revisions to give full recognition to the contributions of Negroes and other racial groups.

About 35 persons appeared at the school board meeting last night in support of a letter sent to the board by the citizens.

The letter asked the board, in its appointment of a new superintendent of schools, to give consideration to his family with problems in race relations and to his "background and desire to guide in solving problems in this field."

This part of the citizens' appeal came too late to have any effect, however. Earlier in the meeting, the board appointed Dr. John F. McKenna, Ottumwa, Iowa, to replace retiring Superintendent Luther A. Foster, as of July 1.

Former Asbury Park Mayor Thomas F. Shebell, master of ceremonies, called it the "largest gathering for a testimonial dinner in Asbury Park ever."

'Overwhelming' Tribute
Mayor Frank H. Rowland called the occasion an "overwhelming and voluntary tribute to a remarkable woman."

The Rev. Marcellino Romagnolo, pastor of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Church, praised Mrs. Flynn for her "tireless work for her church" and called her "a born leader in any branch of life."

Sen. Richard R. Stout brought greetings from the county officials.

After Congressman Charles Sandman paid tribute to Mrs. Flynn on behalf of the New Jersey congressional delegation, Augustus Villapiano, athletic director of Asbury Park High School, recalled that they had been classmates in grammar school and high school and that Mrs. Flynn had been an all-star basketball player.

North Viet Shells Rip 4 U.S. Command Posts

SAIGON (AP) — North Vietnamese forces slammed 500 rounds of mortar and 100-pound rockets into four vital U.S. headquarters in the Hue area today in one of the heaviest coordinated shellings of the war.

Enemy infantrymen also attacked one of the headquarters but were repulsed, the U. S. Command said.

The shellings followed a destructive rocket attack on a U.S. Air Cavalry Division headquarters in the northern war zone Sunday. It too was attacked again today, but damage was far lighter.

At least eight U. S. soldiers and 21 enemy were reported killed in the attacks near Hue.

Another 51 Americans were wounded. In all four cases, headquarters said, material damage was either negligible or light.

Other Points Bombed
At the same time, Viet Cong troops shelled three provincial capitals and two allied airfields—all but one in the Mekong Delta — inflicting at least 65 allied casualties.

Gen. William C. Westmoreland, commander of U. S. forces in Vietnam, said, "The intensity of the war seems to be increasing."

Asked if he thought this was deliberately timed with the Paris peace talks as part of a Communist Command "talk and

fight" strategy, Westmoreland said "circumstantial evidence" would indicate this.

At the northern headquarters at Phu Bai, about 25 miles north of Da Nang, enemy gunners fired in more than 25 rounds of 82mm mortars but military spokesmen reported no casualties and no damage. Air observers directed U. S. fire against the enemy positions with undetermined results, the spokesman said.

The Phu Bai complex is headquarters for Army Lt. Gen. William B. Rossen, who directs American fighting in South Vietnam's two northern most provinces, Thua Thien and Quang Tri.

Markham Tells Parents: No Doubts on Monkhood

SHREWSBURY — "Each person realizes himself in a different way, each has his own path," James E. Markham wrote April 4 in a letter from Bangkok to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Markham, 26 Alameda Court.

For the 28-year-old Peace Corps volunteer, the path has led to a Buddhist monastery in Thailand. He expects within a few months to be ordained, to shave his head, don the yellow robes and pick up the begging bowl of the Buddhist monk.

He confirmed his decision in a telephone call to his parents from Bangkok last week.

He hasn't any doubts about the way.

"I'm sure I'm on the right path," the Monmouth College graduate wrote to his parents on March 17. "I'm doing what I really want to do for perhaps the first time in my life. It will be a spiritual adventure just as exciting, or maybe more so, as going down the Amazon."

With Peace Corps

The Shrewsbury man, who went to Thailand with a Peace Corps rural health education team two years ago, told his parents he expects to spend "at least one year, probably two, and possibly as long as four years" in the Buddhist monkhood.

Why?

"What I am looking for takes a long time and anything short of a lifetime is a compromise,"

he wrote his parents. "Since I still feel attached to American society and expect at present to be making that compromise, what am I seeking for?"

"Greater self-knowledge," he answered, "a greater understanding of the truth, of reality. Also, less attachment to the material or worldly, less craving. Greater serenity and self-love or self-acceptance. Many things."

Through his study of Buddhism, many readings from the Bible "are beginning to make sense," Mr. Markham said.

Forest Monastery

On April 22 he wrote of 10 days spent in a forest monastery in Udorn.

"After I study and become ordained in Bangkok, I hope to go to Udorn to practice meditation," he told his parents.

"Becoming a monk isn't easy," he acknowledged. "In a monastery one is stripped of most escape mechanisms. Only one meal a day—breakfast. One is forced with himself, no easy task. How often do we ever look at ourselves?"

In the monastery, "several hours a day are spent in meditation, developing concentration, tranquility and insight," Mr. Markham explained. "These insights in turn are applied to everyday living in order to affect changes in one's behavior and thought pattern. We are, after all, nothing more

than what we think and what we do."

But the fruits that come from the life of a monk make the hardships worthwhile, Mr. Markham believes.

He is one of five men among the approximately three dozen Westerners studying Buddhism in Bangkok, who are expected to be ordained within the next few months.

End to Desire

The religion he is studying teaches that existence is suffering, that suffering originates in desire and ceases when desire ceases, and that pursuit of behavior based on gentleness, self-denial and compassion will put an end to desire.

It isn't good to become too attached to things or people, Mr. Markham writes, because that brings suffering.

His parents yesterday spoke gently, understandingly, of their son's decision to take the vows of a Buddhist monk.

It isn't a rejection of the Christian faith in which he was reared, they said. Even after ordination, a Buddhist monk is free to leave the monastery any time after a simple departure ceremony.

"He told us about six months ago that he was studying Buddhism because it was an experience he couldn't afford to miss," his father said. "He expects to get this out of his system before he comes home."

Fund Hike For School Jobs Asked

LONG BRANCH — A Board of Education move last night to raise an additional \$123,000 to fund for expansion programs at the Lenna Conrow and Elberon Schools was set aside until 7:30 p.m. tomorrow for final consideration by the Board of School Estimate.

An hour's caucus session by the Estimate Board followed the brief school board session in which a resolution was unanimously approved to ask for the needed funds.

On a motion by Councilman Elliot Katz, the Estimate Board ruled it will delay its decision until tomorrow to "digest a great deal of information" regarding the resolution.

Mayor Paul Nastasio Jr. said after the meeting that, should the board rule in favor of the proposal, it will recommend its passage by City Council, which meets also tomorrow night.

The added \$123,000, it was said, is needed to accept the lowest construction cost bids received for the school expansion program April 17. The original cost estimate of \$1,099,454 is said to be short the amount requested in the Board of Education resolution.

David Means, school board president, said the board continues to try for a Sept. 1, 1969, construction deadline.

Rutgers Dean to Coordinate R-FH School Proposal Study

RUMSON—C. Willard Heckel, dean of Rutgers University Law School, has agreed to serve the Rumson-Fair Haven School Study Committee as study coordinator.

He is expected to be present at the committee's next public meeting, June 3. He will receive a fee of \$75 per meeting.

Last night, the committee heard preliminary reports from Mrs. Charles Krautter, on school enrollment projections, and Theodore K. Tischler, on the educational goals of the three school systems.

Data Wanted

Mr. Tischler's committee, including D. Roger Wight and Donald Howard, intends to "spend as much time as it possibly can in the immediate future in meeting with various segments of the public to find out what residents want for their children in terms of specifics."

The preliminary conclusion of the committee was "That there is no significant difference in the ultimate aims of the two communities toward the educational goals for their children."

Mrs. Krautter's report reflected figures previously published by the three districts, with some revisions. Further studies, she said, will correlate information being sought from planning boards, utility companies, realtors, builders, county agencies, Parent-Teacher organizations and others that may prove helpful.

Mrs. Krautter's committee eventually will make known best possible estimates of en-

rollments from the present through population saturation in the two boroughs, to guide the committee in proposing long-term recommendations for school building programs.

Space Crisis Seen

The figures now available point to an immediate space crisis in the Rumson elementary schools, and enrollment beyond capacity at the high school in 1969-70. In Fair Haven, the educational program is now hampered by structural limitations, Charles E. Howard, superintendent, said.

"Community pressure for change and expansion of the program is not very strong," Mr. Howard said, "but we wouldn't be carrying out our responsibility if we waited

for the community to tell us what to do. Our duty is to provide leadership."

"Our greatest need in Rumson is flexible space in which to try new things," Francis E. Hickey, superintendent, said. With the aid of five pre-fabricated rented classrooms, he has been able to introduce limited team teaching this year.

Dr. John F. Kinney, superintendent at Rumson-Fair Haven Regional High School described areas where he would like to expand offerings, especially in the sciences.

At its June 3 meeting, the committee will hear progress reports from the Tischler and Krautter committees, and receive an initial report from the Educational Facility Committee, headed by Charles Callman, which is studying possible answers to construction needs.

Dean Heckel, who will serve the committee by channeling its discussions into productive spheres, has stated he has no preconceptions about study results. He is not expected to contribute opinions on subjects under discussion.

Dean Heckel has been a member of the Law School faculty since 1946, and became its dean five years ago. He is a graduate of Dartmouth College, received an M.A. in American History from Columbia University and holds an honorary degree from Upsala College. He is chairman of the United Community Corporation, the Federal anti-poverty agency in Newark, and is a trustee of Bloomfield College.

Salvation Army, Planned Parenthood Accepted as United Fund Participants

ASBURY PARK — The Monmouth County United Fund yesterday accepted the Salvation Army and the Planned Parenthood Organization as participating agencies.

The action was taken unanimously by the fund's board of directors at a meeting in the Jersey Central Power and Light Co. building here.

By accepting Planned Parenthood as a member agency, the fund becomes among the

first in the nation to make such a move.

Last year, the Planned Parenthood unit was rejected for membership by the United Fund's budget and admissions committee. But yesterday the positive action was taken without comment by the board.

Leaders Pleased

"I am pleased by the decision of the board of directors," C. Donald Mahoney, fund president and community relations director for Bell Telephone

Laboratories in Holmdel, said after the meeting.

Mrs. Walter Ingram, Little Silver, president of the Monmouth County Planned Parenthood affiliate, said last night she was "very glad" that the organization's request was approved.

"I felt badly about the decision of the board last year," she said. "I do feel that Planned Parenthood should be a part of any health program in the county."

"People today," Mrs. Ingram added, "are more aware of the need for family planning. It is a basic human right for each person to have this choice of whether their family should be large or small."

This brings to 19 the number of participating agencies which will benefit from the 1968-69 United Fund drive. Other agencies are under consideration.

Mr. Mahoney said he also is pleased that the Salvation Army has been added to the agency list.

Potential Appreciated

"I believe more and more county agencies realize the potential of the United Fund," he added.

The recommendation of the new agencies was proposed by Everett Rudloff, chairman of the budget and admissions committee.

Mr. Mahoney also announced the formation of a goal committee to determine the amount to be raised by the upcoming fund campaign.

Adopt Codes on Property Upkeep, Police Appointment Legislation

LITTLE SILVER — Ordinances regulating the appearance of commercial properties and requesting a special state law permitting appointment of Special Officer Harold Giblin Jr. to the regular police force were adopted last night after public hearings at which there weren't any objections.

The property maintenance code sets minimum standards for keeping commercial premises clean, attractive and in good repair. The penalty for violation is \$200 or 90 days in jail, or both, with each day the violation continues considered a separate offense.

Mayor Gordon N. Litwin warned that the property maintenance code will be strictly enforced. He said information about it will be disseminated to owners and occupants of commercial properties and a period of grace allowed.

To Petition State

Passage of the ordinance pertaining to Officer Giblin means the governing body now will petition the state legislature for authorization to appoint him a regular policeman, as the police chief and council want to do. The action is necessary because Officer Giblin is seven years older than the maximum age limit of 30.

Councilman Thomas B. Judge, police committee chairman, reported receipt of petitions signed by approximately 200 residents supporting appointment of Mr. Giblin to the regular force, and Joseph Sinicus, Pinckney Road, last night presented a petition signed by approximately 40 others. Mr. Judge said the petitions will accompany the governing body's plea to the legislature, and he urged residents to convey their support of Mr. Giblin's appointment to Monmouth's representatives in the state Senate and Assembly.

Passed Handily

Bailey Gets Scolding From Supreme Court

TRENTON (AP) — Boston attorney F. Lee Bailey, who got a severe scolding from the New Jersey Supreme Court, now awaits word from the same court on his legal future in the Garden State.

Bailey is seeking reinstatement as defense lawyer in the mysteriously tangled Kavanaugh-DeFranco murder case. The court did not indicate

when it would rule on the appeal.

Legal observers envisioned several possibilities:

- It could refuse to reinstate him.
- Bar him from future practice in the state.
- Permit him to remain in this case but wait to the end of the trial before issuing any disciplinary action.

—Scold him in a written opinion but permit him to continue to practice in New Jersey.

—Allow him to remain in this case but bar him from future cases.

Rejection of his appeal for reinstatement would send the matter back to federal court which declined to rule on an appeal pending exhaustion of all state remedies.

MIDDLETOWN — The Economic Development Commission paid rent to meet last night at 934 Rt. 35, a building which houses the township Republican headquarters.

Sample Ballot's Long List No Fear Cause

FREEHOLD — Monmouth County voters soon will be receiving a large sheet of paper in the mails containing more than 114 names but, said County Clerk J. Russell Woolley, it's not as frightening as it might appear.

The county clerk yesterday called a special news conference to explain the format of the June 4 primary election ballot.

"When the residents get a ballot of this size, it usually scares them to death," said Mr. Woolley.

While the sheet will contain more than 100 names, voters can't simply pick and choose during a primary. Registered Republicans are restricted to Republican candidates and Democrats to Democrats. If they try to cross party lines, their attempts will not count.

On the sample ballots given to reporters, no local candidates were listed. When they are, the list will increase in number and in length.

317 Machines Set

Thomas W. Kerwin, chief custodian of voting machines, said that the county will use

317 out of the 425 machines it has. There are 299 voting districts in the county, he said.

While the ballot is large, Mr. Woolley said that it is much smaller compared with the one four years ago in the last presidential election.

The ballot contains eight columns, three for Republicans, one blank and four for Democrats.

Reversal Seen

Mr. Woolley is predicting a larger Democratic turnout for the primary than from Republicans because he said there are more contests in the Democratic ranks.

But said P. Paul Campi, county Democratic leader, adding that there have not been any large meetings for any one particular candidate.

Mr. Campi hopes that the Democrats will turn out in larger numbers.

In past years, the Republicans have turned out in greater numbers than the Democrats. Last year, for example, a quiet year, 14.8 per cent of the county's eligible voters voted. Of this, there were 14,774

Republicans and 11,545 Democrats.

Taking up the largest portion of the ballot are the candidates for delegates - at - large and their alternates for the political conventions. The Republicans have a choice of ten each, while the Democrats only have five.

Mr. Kerwin said that the Democrats had 35 delegates on the ballot four years ago but only have the five this year.

The ballot has a column for the Republican Party Organization; the Reform Republican, and two names listed in the third column, a candidate under the banner of the "Favored - Son - Of - My - Favorite-Father," and a Regular Republican Organization, one.

Mr. Woolley said that the names in the second column for the GOP side are those from Essex County.

The Democrats appear to have some mysteries on their side of the ballot.

It has a column headed the Regular Democratic Organization, McCarthy for President, Jesse Gray for President and United Democrats.

Top of the News

NEWARK — The International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers has called on the federal mediation and conciliation service to intervene in the six week long strike at New Jersey Bell Telephone Co.

Charles T. Merrigan, president of IBEW Local 27 issued the call yesterday after a fruitless 20 minute session between company and union officials at the Military Park Hotel — the first negotiating meeting since the union rejected the company's proposed three year contract last Thursday.

Merrigan said the company was putting "its desire for revenge against five strikers accused of misconduct, ahead of its responsibilities to the public."

He said company representatives stated bluntly that they had offered all they were going to offer in the way of wages and other conditions and had adamantly refused to drop disciplinary action against the five strikers.

Negroes End School Boycott

NEWARK — Negro students have called an end to their week-old boycott of the city's eight high schools.

But at a news conference yesterday, they vowed to press for greater emphasis on black culture in the school's curricula.

Flanked by parents and community leaders, Alvin Hanks, a Weequahic High School junior who served as spokesman for the group, told a news conference at the Abyssinian Baptist Church that it was time for the school system's black majority to assert itself.

"The majority rules, baby, and the majority wants black representation," he said.

Norwegian Ship Burns

LONDON — The 5,000-ton Norwegian passenger ship Blenheim caught fire in the North Sea today, but all of her 9 passengers got safely away from the ship. One passenger was reported injured.

Some of the 78 members of the crew also took to the ship's lifeboats, but the rest stayed aboard to fight the fire. As rescue ships arrived, other crews joined in the fight against the blaze.

Beating of GIs Protested

PRINCETON — Three student leaders at Princeton Theological Seminary said yesterday they sent letters to political and military leaders protesting what they said was the beating of anti-war demonstrators at Ft. Dix on Armed Forces Day.

The students claim that the demonstrators, six students and a professor, were beaten by civilians before being ejected from the post by Military Police.

The Military Police just stood back and refused to interfere while the beatings were taking place, the students said.

Limit Confessions Rule

TRENTON — The New Jersey Supreme Court ruled yesterday that the Miranda rule on confessions does not have to be applied in motor vehicle suspension or revocation hearings.

The high court issued a 6-0 decision in an appeal by the state motor vehicle division.

The case involves a two-year revocation of the driving privileges of Joseph M. David, 23, of Bridgeton, following a fatal accident in Egg Harbor Township in 1965. The court directed Miss June Strelecki to modify the penalty against David for other reasons.

David had contended that a statement about the accident which he made at the Mays Landing police station could not be used as evidence against him because he had not been advised of his right to remain silent.

Release Liver Transplant

DENVER, Colo. — Randall Wayne Bennett, 2, one of four known survivors of liver transplant operations, has been discharged from the University of Colorado Medical Center.

Would Calm Aided Students

TRENTON — A bill designed to prevent a college student who holds a state scholarship or educational incentive grant from participating in campus demonstrations such as the one which closed Columbia University this month was introduced yesterday in the Assembly.

Assassination Plot Foiled

JAKARTA — The Indonesian government foiled a plot two months ago to kill President Suharto and 19 of his generals and cabinet ministers as they prayed at a mosque, officials at the presidential palace said Monday.

May Start Drugs Course

TRENTON — A program to educate both high school teachers and teenagers to the abuses of drugs would start this summer under a bill passed by the Senate yesterday.

Extend Trial by Jury

WASHINGTON — Defendants in all but "petty" criminal cases are entitled to the chance to be tried by juries, a precedent-shattering Supreme Court has ruled.

"Trial by jury in criminal cases is fundamental to the American scheme of justice," Justice Byron R. White said in the 7-2 decision yesterday.

Will Swear Negro Mayor

MONTCCLAIR — Former Public Works Director Matthew G. Carter is scheduled to take his oath of office today as the first Negro mayor of this predominantly white Essex County community.

Carter topped a field of 11 contestants in Sunday's election of the town's five commissioners.

Variance Is Approved For Addition to Mart

MIDDLETOWN — The Zoning Board last night granted a variance permitting a 32,000-square-foot addition to The Mart, Rt. 35, furniture store owned by Samuel and Rose Sheltelman.

The variance permits a decrease in the side yard setback from the required 100 feet to 32 feet. Also permitted is reduction of the parking requirements from the required 720-car capacity to 51.

The proposed addition will provide display area and warehouse space on the northern and eastern sides of the present

40,000-square-foot building. The application was presented last month by local attorney John R. Halleran.

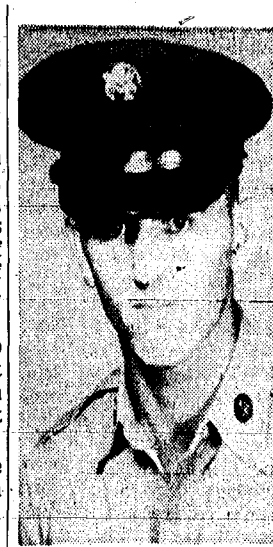

Mrs. Brenner Offers Programs And a Political Wrangle Erupts

MATAWAN TOWNSHIP — As promised, Mrs. Marilyn Brenner, former Democratic councilwoman, last night recommended a series of programs for the Township Council to initiate in areas of drainage, road work, youth activity, water and erosion problems.

The list of programs was in response to a challenge by Republican Mayor Hans W. Froehlich that the former councilwoman had given little in the way of constructive ideas but only criticism of the present Republican administration.

Politics however entered the discussion as Mrs. Brenner concluded and Mr. Froehlich challenged with, "These are good ideas, but why didn't you bring them up while in office?"

Jerome R. Kaye, one of the three Democratic councilmen

on the governing body, rose to defend Mrs. Brenner's motives, saying:

"There is no reason for Mrs. Brenner to be ashamed to bring up valid suggestions now and certainly no indication she didn't have them as a councilwoman," he said. "There is no reason for you to belittle these ideas because they are from a person of another party."

Democratic Councilman Walter Gehricke also criticized Mr. Froehlich's outburst, commenting, "You seem to have a Freudian complex about Mrs. Brenner. Just because an idea didn't originate with you is no reason to take umbrage to it."

Mrs. Brenner's suggestions included:

—Authorization to the township engineer to begin plans for sidewalks and road improvement along So. Atlantic Ave.

—For the council to join with the Utilities Authority in a survey of future water services. This would include possible extension of water service and consolidation of the several sources now supplying homes in the township.

Erosion Problems

—A survey of erosion problems especially in the Cliffwood Beach area. Mrs. Brenner suggested a probe into what federal funds are available for a beachfront erosion survey or a petition to the Army Corps of Engineers for a long-range program to arrest present erosion and prevent future erosion.

—A drainage survey based on a priority list to alleviate the most severe conditions.

—A citizens planning advisory committee to advise the planning board and council on future zoning, beautification, employing education and skills of the residents within the township qualified in the fields of architecture, engineering, etc.

—Formation of a Human Rights Council, presently under consideration by the council.

—A youth employment program to provide jobs for teenagers with the Department of Public Works. This would include work in maintenance of parks and street cleanup. Mrs. Brenner also urged using the talents of high school athletes in establishing clinics for children of the areas in a variety of sports.

Hughes' economic policy advisers, however, have said that \$15 million would be the maximum that could be realized from a lottery.

Assemblyman John Brown, R-Ocean, chief proponent of the lottery referendum, has argued that run properly a state lottery could realize in excess of \$200 million. His proposal earmarks such funds for state aid to education and for state institutions.

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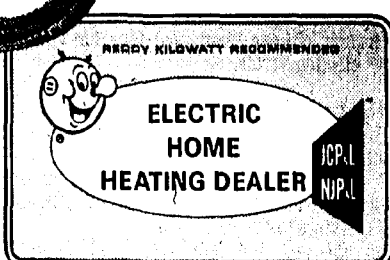
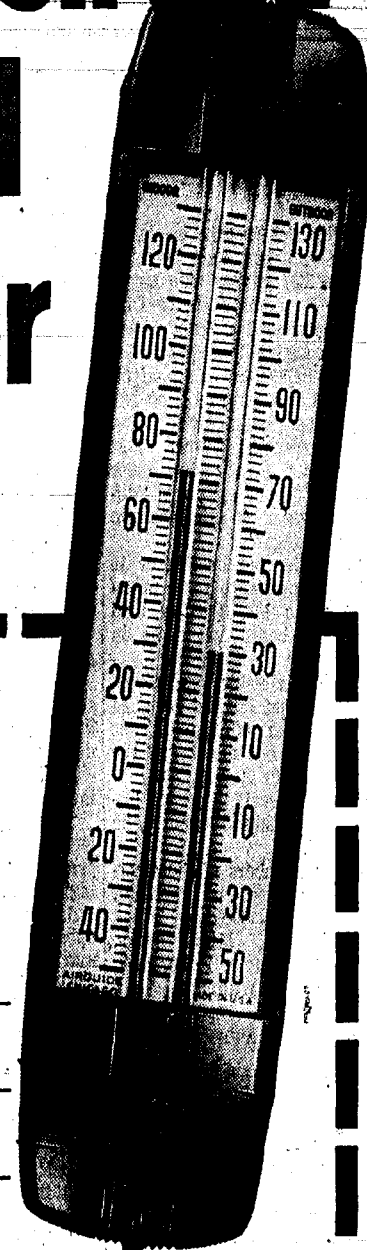
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Tuition Costs Go Up

A college tuition increase is never welcome — for the students and for their parents who, for the most part, are paying the bills.

But the word has gone out from the state Board of Higher Education that tuition rates at the six New Jersey state colleges will be more than doubled — from \$150 to \$350 a year.

The Higher Education board broke the news gently. It said that scholarships and aid would increase to take care of all needy students. And applicants who demonstrate a need will receive assistance.

It is good to know that about 20 per cent of the \$4.8 million expected to accrue from the increased tuition will go for substantial teacher salary increases at the colleges. Other money will go for increased student tuition aid; for faculty members to teach expanded student enrollments, and for more library and laboratory facilities.

At the same time, the board noted that the tuition increase will "main-

tain reasonable parity in the tuition charged to students in New Jersey's institutions of higher education. . ."

The new rates will reverse the present situation, under which tuition at the state colleges is only about one-half the tuition at the two-year county colleges.

We share the concern of the board in calling attention to the "inadequacy of current student aid." It urged programs of increased aid for both the economically and educationally disadvantaged. This aspect must be strongly stressed.

In some ways it is unfortunate that this action had to be taken. But the present financial plight of higher education in the state helped dictate the increase, the first since 1957.

The big consolation is that no student will be forced to drop out of college because of the new rates. This should be reassuring to many students and their parents.

The Parkway and Senior Citizens

It was encouraging to read that the Garden State Parkway's senior citizen toll collectors are among the most permanent members of its staff.

The New Jersey Highway Authority, which operates the parkway, made note of this fact during Senior Citizens Month.

There is less turnover among the part-time senior citizens than among the younger men working full time as toll collectors, a parkway spokesman noted.

Matter of fact, five of the first eight hired when the first program began in 1960 are still on the job. All but seven of the over-60 toll collectors working are over 65 and 32 of them are over 70 years old. There are now 87 senior citizens employed in the program that began experimentally.

The Garden State Parkway de-

serves great credit for providing job opportunities for senior citizens. The pioneer effort can be considered a model for business, industry and even government.

D. Louis Tonti, the highway authority's executive director, says senior citizens are being hired not out of sentiment — but out of "good business sense." They provide the parkway with much-needed part-time help at peak traffic hours.

We are not impressed with the parkway critics who view superhighway as a vast automated network that excludes the human element. From what we have seen, the Highway Authority has developed a responsible and effective approach to a serious problem. Its efforts with senior citizens and young people are particularly commendable.

The Library Opening

Red Bankers will be happy to hear that the public library is expected to be in full operation by Sept. 1.

The Library Board made the announcement the other night — and it will be welcome news to the many residents who have complained about the delays.

What happened in the construction project was regrettable — but understandable. The important thing now is that a completion date has been set. Every effort should be made to adhere to that date.

At least the temporary library continues to remain open. It was a good move on the part of borough officials and it at least provides library facilities at a critical time.

Red Bank, when the building is completed, will have a first-rate library in its midst. And, even though there have been hardships, it is worth waiting for. A borough with Red Bank's cultural and economic importance and its potential population growth will be enhanced by the new library facility.

Pat Brown for McCarthy?

Senator McCarthy's close lieutenants are claiming he is about to gain a headline accession — former California Governor Edmund "Pat" Brown.

According to the McCarthy grapevine, Brown will declare for the Minnesota "in a few days."

If that does happen, it could help McCarthy in California's potentially fateful June 4 primary, particularly in the northern part of the state which has been Brown's main political base.

For Brown to declare for McCarthy would mean bolting the Johnson slate of convention delegates he was active in organizing early this year. The slate is headed by Attorney General Thomas Lynch. Since the President's surprise announcement that he would not seek another term, there has been no move on the part of Lynch, Brown and other leaders of the slate to switch to Vice President Humphrey.

Kennedy sources are putting out the word that Johnson-Humphrey forces are throwing their weight to McCarthy as part of a backstage "stop Kennedy" strategy. It is authoritatively known that strenuous efforts are being made to swing ex-Governor Brown to McCarthy. Reputedly, his son, who has been a McCarthy supporter from the start, is active in this endeavor.

In Santa Barbara last week, Brown told newsmen he would choose between Senators Kennedy and McCarthy before the June 4 primary. But he carefully gave no hint of his possible choice, pointing out that he has long been a warm admirer of Humphrey, thanks highly of McCarthy, and feels indebted to Kennedy, who campaigned for him in 1966 when he unsuccessfully sought a third term.

The Johnson delegate slate, on which Brown is listed, will be on the official bal-

lot. What effect his defection to McCarthy might have is conjectural. Statewide polls show the slate running a tepid third.

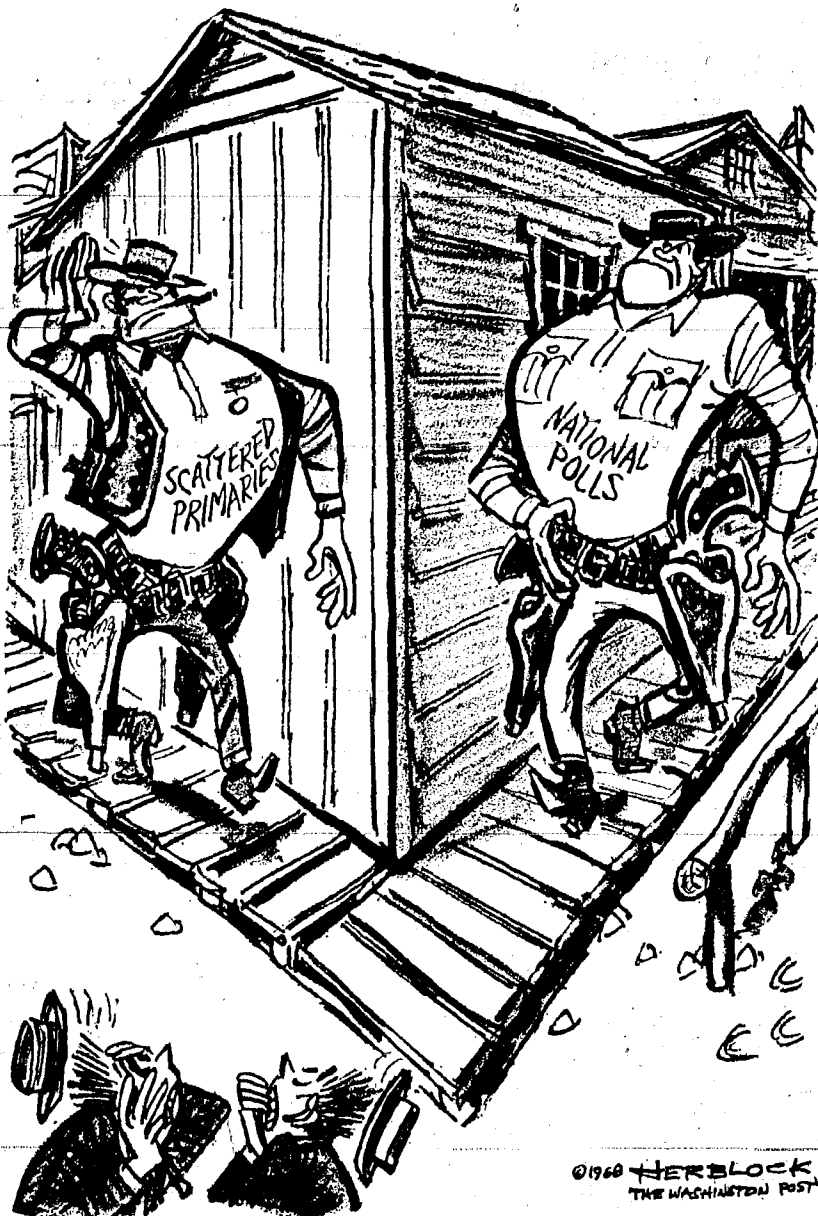
McCarthy and his lieutenants are straining every effort to score in California. The Minnesota failure there would spell finis for him as a serious contender at the August convention. He not only has to win the California primary but do so decisively to be a real factor at the Chicago showdown.

In this eventful stretch drive, McCarthy continues to be seriously hampered by a dearth of funds and floundering organization and management.

In an effort to cope with both weaknesses, he has gained the assistance of Stephen Mitchell, Chicago attorney, who was the late Adlai Stevenson's campaign manager and Democratic national chairman in 1952. Widely experienced in the political arena and well regarded by politicians of all factions, Mitchell has taken charge of McCarthy's West Coast campaign, where his nomination chances might very well be determined in Oregon's primary next Tuesday and in California on June 4.

There has been no announcement about Mitchell's joining McCarthy's staff, but the effect is already evident in a number of ways.

VIETNAM HEADLINES — North Vietnam is using President Ho Chi Minh's birthday as a spur to greater production. He will be 78 on May 19. Hanoi's propaganda machine has been urging workers to greater effort as part of an "emulation drive" in honor of the occasion. The pressure now is on in both agriculture and industry. . . Ho Chi Minh also has sent word to his negotiators in Paris to press for a halt in U.S. bombing of all North Vietnam by May 19. . . Communist China is maintaining its daily propaganda support for what it terms the "Negro revolution" in the U.S. The campaign began with a rare personal statement by Chairman Mao Tse-Tung on the shooting of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

Notes From Oregon Trail

PORTLAND, Ore. — This is God's country, out where the Willamette flows, but Wayne Morse seems to have leased a pretty good piece of it. At 67, the old professor is riding his range as confidently as a rodeo champ in a stock cattle show. His bid for renomination next week has stolen most of the Oregon play.

The senator's primary opponent is Robert B. Duncan, a 47-year-old lawyer who served two terms in the House. Two years ago, Duncan ran a good race for the Senate against Republican Mark Hatfield. He lost, but anti-Morse factions urged him to try again this time for bigger game. The betting is that Morse will dump him without much trouble.

Nevertheless, Morse is spending money in torrents and cascades. He is campaigning in high schools and labor halls. His bushy brows peer from posters everywhere. A campaign biography modestly acclaims him as able, active, battle-scarred, brilliant, conscientious, consistent, controversial, courageous, dedicated, determined, devoted, effective, ethical, experienced, fair, farsighted, fearless, forceful, forthright, forward-looking, friendly, frugal, great, happy, hardworking, humane, idealistic, incisive, indefatigable, independent, industrious, intelligent, liberal, outspoken, perceptive, pioneering, principled, productive, realistic, respected, rugged, statesmanlike, tactful, tireless, uncommon, unfailing, vigilant, vigorous, and warm. It scarcely seems too much to say.

MORSE'S CRITICS, of course, would compile a rather different list. The newspapers are supporting Duncan, but Morse treats the papers as he treats most of mankind, with a truculent disdain. He lives in a love-hate relationship with Oregon voters, but every six years, at least, they seem to love him just enough. Come November, assuming his victory next week, Morse will gobble up a beardless young Republican by the name of Bob Packwood. Six more years of Wayne! The prospect is as glum as the Oregon skies.

YOUR MONEY'S WORTH

Money Really Makes Money

By SYLVIA PORTER

In this "Vietnam era," money has been making money on a scale rarely seen in our society or any other.

If, for instance, you have had money to put in a savings account or to lend directly to others, you've leaped ahead. You are earning record amounts of interest on your savings; and the pace of rise in interest income is far outrunning the pace of rise for most other types of income. Last year, you earned \$22.4 billion in interest, 25.1 per cent more than you earned in 1965.

If you have a solid, well-paying job, you are getting all-time peak amounts in fringe benefits. Your fringe benefit total is now rising at a much faster rate than your basic pay. Last year, you received \$45.9 billion in fringe benefits, 31.5 per cent more than you received in 1965.

If you have funds invested in the stock market, you're earning record sums in dividends as well as making big capital gains. Last year, you earned \$22.8 billion in dividends, 15.2 per cent more than in 1965.

IF, HOWEVER, you are a landlord, depending for your living on the rents you receive, you are falling relatively behind in our economy in terms of how others are managing.

If you are a small businessman, you also have not been sharing in the economic bonanza of the 1965-68 Vietnam era.

And if you are a farmer, you're abysmally far behind.

In this era, those who have money — or at least a pipeline to money via a job offering fringe benefits as well as pay — are the big winners. Those who depend strictly on work to keep ahead financially aren't keeping ahead.

To be sure, the ordinary wage-earner is now bringing home record dollar totals. But because of the steep rise in living costs, his actual buying power has barely kept up. If you've escaped the living cost pinch, a key reason is almost surely the fringe benefits your employer is paying you.

Corporations are earning record profits, but primarily because of rising costs of labor and materials, the rate of rise in profits is only about one-third of the overall rate of rise in the national income.

THE LANDLORD's relative "loss" is due to the fact that we are increasingly a nation of homeowners and cooperatives, paying interest on mortgages rather than monthly rent. Since 1929, the landlord's slice of the national income pie has dropped from 6.3 per cent to 3.1 per cent.

The farmer, especially the small farmer, is facing steadily climbing costs of equipment, farm vehicles, feed grains, labor. These cost rises are not being made up for by equivalent rises in the prices farmers receive for their products. Since 1948, the farmer's share of the nation's income has plummeted from 7.8 per cent to 2.3 per cent. Last year alone, his income was slashed \$1.3 billion.

One, the Citizens Committee on Higher Education which was chaired by President Goheen of Princeton and lately the Governor's Commission for Capital Needs in New Jersey. Both of them have been studies in depth and their findings are extremely serious for the well being of our state. New Jersey ranks last among the states of this nation in the amount of money that is spent per pupil in the field of higher education. This is particularly regrettable inasmuch as New Jersey is seventh in per capita income. 63% of the students graduating from high school go out of the state to college adding to the expenses of their parents as the cost out of state is naturally higher than it would be within the state.

Piecemeal fiscal planning over a period of ten years or more in the end will cost the taxpayers greater sums of money than if a wise, business-like plan were decided on now, so that as the lists of entrants grow, as they must due to the increase in population, the state will be able to offer its students a well coordinated college structure.

In planning for our university, state colleges and county colleges, we must offer our young people the best type of education and good teachers to implement this. We are competing for teachers with other states that offer teachers higher salaries than we do and we must at least be within a range that will attract well qualified personnel. Many buildings in our state colleges are completely inadequate in both dormitory space and classrooms. I have served since last January on the Mohclair State Teachers College Board of Trustees and I have seen all this with my own eyes.

After all, our young people are New Jersey's greatest resource. In these days of specialization, a high school diploma will not open the doors of good jobs to its graduates. Those qualified need the college experience and training so that their lives will be meaningful.

Again my thanks to you for agreeing with my stand. I hope that the legislature will put the suggested plan of the bond issue on the ballot this coming November and that the people of New Jersey will support it.

Freehold Council Pushes Townhouses

FREEHOLD — The possibility of developing a townhouse community here took a leap forward last night as Borough Council introduced an amendment to the zoning ordinance and forwarded it to the Planning Board.

The proposal came as the result of a request by Hovnanian Brothers, builders, for the borough to consider such a concept.

Hovnanian first presented the idea to the Planning Board in January. The original proposal called for a complex of 182 units valued in the area of \$3 million. Since then the plan has been altered down and to 145-155 units.

The Planning Board, which originally recommended the proposal to the council, now will study the proposed amendment and make recommendations on it.

Requirements Specified

The carefully phrased document sets up a lengthy list of requirements for planning and construction.

The minimum site area would be five acres, with no more than 10 dwelling units per acre. Minimum lot size would be 20 by 90 feet. Set backs would be 20 feet in the front and 25 in the rear.

Varied designs, architectural modes and setbacks for the purpose of presenting aesthetically desirable residences" would be required, the amendment said.

The new code would also set up conditions of sale and own-

ership. All units would be developed on a non-rental basis, with each individual unit available for sale. All common lands would be owned and maintained by the developer, the dwelling unit owners or an association of owners.

A model of the proposed Hovnanian development was presented to the council. In addition to landscaped grounds it showed a lake and swimming pool as part of the complex.

After study by the Planning Board, the measure presumably will be presented for adoption and a public hearing will be held.

Atlantic City Won't Charge Beach Fee

ATLANTIC CITY (AP) — They say the best things in life are free.

It may not apply to much any more, but it still goes for this resort's beach and boardwalk.

For a while last winter it looked as if the millions of summer visitors were going to have to pay to enjoy the salt air and water. The idea of imposing a beach fee was discussed as a means of raising additional revenues.

But it was vetoed by the Chamber of Commerce.

"It is a fine thing for the resorts which have it, but not for Atlantic City at the present time," said Chamber President John R. Stracusa.

Most New Jersey resorts north of Seaside Heights charge bathers, and the idea has been discussed off and on here for several years. Beaches south of Atlantic City are toll free.

Cost Skyrockets

"The cost of maintaining the beach and boardwalk has skyrocketed along with all other municipal costs," explained Al Owen, executive director of the chamber. He placed the figure at "upwards of \$600,000 a year."

This includes repainting the seven - mile long boardwalk, cleaning the white stretches of beach, paying lifeguards and even clearing the promenade of snow in the winter so the resort can live up to its slogan: "There's no snow on the boardwalk."

"With our small year-round population a beach fee had to be considered," Owen said. "Actually, we explored all areas that might provide relief to already overburdened property tax payers."

This included charging tolls on the three bridges leading to the city. It would have been cheaper and easier to enforce than a beach fee, but, it too was rejected.

"We decided the beach and boardwalk is our front door and number one calling card,"

Plan Unit Sees More Aid Needed

NEW YORK (AP) — The Region Plan Association says the core cities in the New York metropolitan area should be spending about \$3.6 billion on services for the poor, more than twice current spending.

The association recommended, however, that all such expenses should be taken over by the federal government so that the 10 core cities could concentrate their resources on making city living competitive with the suburbs.

The recommendations were contained in a study report undertaken as part of the association's second regional plan. The plan is intended as a guide for the development of the New Jersey - New York - Connecticut megalopolis to the year 2,000.

The New York - based association is a research and planning civic organization supported by voluntary membership.

It called for increasing public expenditures for the poor nationally from an estimated \$11.5 billion annually now, by all levels of government, to \$26.5 billion a year. The figures do not include the cost of upgrading housing.

The national estimates were based on a study of the budgets and services provided by the 10 core cities: New York City, and Mount Vernon, N.Y., Newark, Paterson, Trenton, Elizabeth and Passaic, N.J., and Bridgeport, New Haven and Waterbury, Conn. The entire county of Hudson in New Jersey also was included.

School Class Files to Be Microfilmed

MATAWAN TOWNSHIP — Class registers dating back to 1893 will be microfilmed and then destroyed, the Regional Board of Education decided last night.

Red Bank Area Has First Interfaith Dinner

RED BANK — Another ecumenical first was scored here last night.

The houses of worship of the Greater Red Bank Area held their proposed initial interfaith dinner at the First Presbyterian Church.

Religious and laymen of all races from the Catholic, Protestant and Jewish communities participated. About 225 persons attended the event,

which marked the initiation of such a convocation among religious leaders in this community.

The Rev. William A. Anderson of St. James Catholic Church, here, gave the invocation.

Red Bank Municipal Court Judge Francis X. Kennelly delineated the history of interfaith study groups, which started one year ago under

the guidance of Milton M. Abramoff, who delivered the welcoming address.

Judge Kennelly defined the groups' aims as "studying, appreciating and breaking down any differences which may exist."

He expounded on what has been done to "remove walls of prejudice," and detailed his own renewed understanding of the Jewish faith.

"Sharing activities and actions in the community" was the theme of the Rev. Leonard G. Rowell of the First Methodist Church. He talked on behalf of the Red Bank Area Interfaith Clergymen's Council.

Discussing the assassination of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. as the event which brought together clergymen of all denominations

more than any other single one in history, he pointed out the need for being flexible in involvement in the solution of community problems.

Dean Friday of Shrewsbury Friends Meeting (Quakers) recounted the history of the Council of Churches here and outlined its present work.

"Faith and order, life and work" were the themes of the evening's principal speaker, Dr. Alexander Shaw, ex-

ecutive director, New Jersey Council of Churches.

Traces History

He traced the history of the National Council of Churches in America and said, "We are living in tremendous days," as far as the ecumenical movement is concerned.

Pointing out what he called the sense of oneness in Jesus Christ, and adding to it the potential understanding between Christian and Jew, Dr.

Shaw concluded that the spirits of Christendom and Israel are both needed to put order into today's world.

He noted that these are "times of power unlimited," of more mental illness, divorce and unrest than in all history. This is true, he said, in spite of unparalleled economic prosperity.

He added it pointed up strongly the purpose of a meeting such as last night's

— the task to use the wisdom and knowledge of how men can control, together, their spiritual and physical lives in line with the will of God.

In giving the benediction, Rabbi Jack M. Rosoff of Congregation B'nai Israel, Rumson, expressed gratitude for the occasion and hope that increased knowledge of one another's religions would be used for the education of all.

Matawan Township Opposition Seen Barrier to Realignment of Line Road

MATAWAN TOWNSHIP — This township's dissatisfaction with the Public Utilities Commission ruling in favor of a Hazlet request to eliminate the Line Road grade crossing may yet prevent the venture.

On May 2, the PUC granted the request that Line Road be moved approximately 1,200 feet west to Lloyd Road to eliminate the New York-Long Branch railroad crossing.

The commission suggested the two townships meet with the railroad to decide where to realign the road and to iron out differences of opinion.

This township had opposed the realignment because Hazlet had not conferred with council here before approaching the PUC. Council had also pointed to several problems which could result from the realignment such as a steep grade and loss of taxable property.

At last night's Township Council meeting, Township Manager William J. Schuchart read the decision of the PUC, adding that the board had suggested a meeting of all the principals next week to settle matters.

Township Attorney William Russell advised that a week would be insufficient to gather the necessary data. Council decided on the second week of June as a possible meeting time.

In the meantime, the council will turn the data over to the Planning Board, township engineer and planning con-

sultant to suggest the best possible route for realignment or an alternate solution to the problem.

Questioned by Councilman Jerome R. Kaye as what possible alternate solution would be reached in view of the PUC ruling, Mr. Russell said the commission can only direct the elimination of the crossing; it cannot enforce the realignment.

DECISION REQUIRED

Mr. Russell added, in response to a question later from the audience, that should Hazlet and this township fail to reach an equitable decision, Line Road would probably not be realigned.

"The PUC has no authority and the order would probably be dropped until such time as we can reconcile our differences," the attorney said.

Mayor Hans J. Froehlich said several questions must be answered before a decision could be reached in any case, especially what the best method would be to retain tax rates, cause the least tax loss, and provide the greatest safety factor; and how to maintain the road and whether traffic lights will be needed and where.

He added that an alternative might be a bridge across the railroad tracks. It will be up to the planners to suggest costs along this line.

Mr. Russell said the PUC would probably not object if an economically feasible alternative is found to the realignment.

The PUC will stand 85 per cent of the estimated \$70,000, the railroad, 15 per cent.

Mayor Froehlich explained that consideration must also be given to the future widening of the Garden State Parkway, which may intervene with the realignment.

The matter precipitated a heated discussion during the public session. Norman Brenner of 83 Deerfield Lane questioned why a proposed second hearing at the PUC on the issue was canceled.

Mr. Russell explained that all evidence to be presented at the hearing was forwarded by mail after attorneys for both sides agreed to a cancellation.

Mr. Kaye argued at length that the council had not been apprised of the decision until the night before the scheduled hearing, too late to proceed.

He charged the attorney had taken matters into his own hands without consulting the council and had acted unwisely.

Councilman Walter Gehricke agreed. He said, "When an attorney represents a township he has to be guided by policy decisions of the council and I am not going to abdicate this power."

Area Sewerage Confab Is Set

FREEHOLD — The Monmouth County Planning Board will hold a public hearing Monday, June 17, at 4 p.m. to hear views on two proposed amendments to its regional sewerage system for the Bayshore.

The board is considering separating Highlands and Atlantic Highlands from the Middletown system and making it a separate regional area.

It also is thinking about incorporating recommendations for the interceptor line for the Bayshore to the outfall.

Informally Discussed

Planning Director Charles M. Pike said that these changes have been discussed informally and the board now wants to take official action on them.

These changes will make the system even more feasible, he said, adding that the best solution is a common outfall.

He added that the board received requests from Highlands and Atlantic Highlands over a year ago to make these changes.

The changes are part of the regional sewerage system which the board revealed last April.

The report, containing several suggestions, recommended a common outfall line to convey the treated wastes from the Bayshore towns into the Atlantic Ocean so that no treated effluent would be discharged

into the Sandy Hook Bay or Raritan Bay.

The proposed system, estimated at \$10.2 million, recommended a treatment plant in the Highlands - Atlantic Highlands area instead of pumping the treated wastes back to Middletown where it would be dumped into the ocean.

Mr. Pike said that these two amendments are just to change the plan formally to bring it in line with what has been agreed upon earlier.

Maps Price Set

The Planning Board also set a price of 50 cents for sets of six Monmouth County maps. The colorful maps previously had been free.

Mr. Pike said that the board has received some request for thousands of the maps and that they are costly to print.

Freeholder Benjamin H. Danskin added that each map costs the county about 35 cents each.

The maps and the sale of them will be handled by the county clerk's office in the Hall of Records here.

The board continued for another year its experimental planning programs for Wall Township and Freehold Township.

Mr. Pike said the county board is updating the master plan for Wall Township and should be completed this fall. The county board is advising the Freehold Township board on a continuing planning program.

The board also recommended federal open space programs for Wall Township and Red Bank. These plans are reviewed by the county board before they are forwarded to the federal government for action.

Wall Township is planning a 55-acre Open Space program along the Allenwood-Lakewood Road and Red Bank has two projects, one park at Marion St. and Harrison Ave. and the other between W. Front St. and Wharf Ave.

Mr. Pike said that the board will meet with Commissioner Robert A. Roe of the Department of Conservation and Economic Development on May 29 at 2 p.m. in Trenton to discuss plans for the Manasquan Reservoir.

Myron Taylor, director of industrial development, reported that there will be a state sponsored world trade seminar in the Kings Grant Inn, Lakewood, Wednesday. The program is to stimulate interests in developing international markets, he said.

Modern Teacher Ends 42-Year Career

SHREWSBURY — Miss Marie Hamm, a vivacious first grade teacher as modern as tomorrow, is leaving the classroom she has occupied for 34 yesteryears.

Her retirement from the Shrewsbury Grammar School next month marks the end of a 42-year teaching career, 34 of them here.

Although preparing for retirement, Miss Hamm, as ever unafraid of new ideas, enthusiastically undertook teaching the new readiness program initiated here with one first grade class this year, Principal Curtis Bradley said admiringly.

"Basically, it was setting up a new curriculum," Mr. Bradley said. "It meant a disruption in the normal teaching routine. It also meant a lot of work and planning. Miss Hamm was in school until 5:30 many evenings."

It's one of the things she hates to leave, Miss Hamm said one recent afternoon as she reminisced about her years as pupil and teacher in the Shrewsbury School. She spoke affectionately about her students — past and present — and with reluctance about herself.

Local Native

A native of this borough, Miss Hamm was graduated from the Shrewsbury School, Red Bank High School and what was then Newark State Normal School. She taught in the Carteret grade school from 1927 to 1934, when she returned here to teach.

Her more than 900 students here includes two generations of Shrewsbury residents, and the grandchildren of her former teachers.

The Shrewsbury School, now 25 classrooms with 600 students, had only 70 students and four classrooms when Miss Hamm was hired. Each room contained several grades. There were 19 students in the first three — reception, first and second grades — to which she was assigned.

The classes were housed in the present Broad St. building, which Miss Hamm had attended.

"We thought we were big stuff when we grew to need five teachers," she laughingly

recalled. "Now we have three first grade classes alone."

Growth of the student body and expansion of the physical plant aren't the only changes.

"When I first began teaching the teacher was the main factor," Miss Hamm said, "and the classroom was teacher-centered. The teacher taught what she thought the children should be interested in. Today the children are the main factor, the classroom is child-centered."

She paused mischievously. "If you think I'm going to say it was better then, in the good old days," she continued, "you're mistaken. I'm not one who believes that. Today we take our cue from the children, from their interests and their abilities. And the children are happier, they come to school because they want to, and they like school better."

"Of course, we have so much more materials to work with today," she added.

If first graders have changed any in the past 34 years "it's for the better," Miss Hamm believes.

'Progress, Growth'

"It means progress and growth," she declared firmly. Retirement will give Miss Hamm time to visit with her family in Canada and to indulge her hobbies, which in-

clude sewing and collecting antique dishes, glassware and furniture.

The Shrewsbury PTA will fete her at a tea and reception in the school's Fern Ross Auditorium Sunday, June 9.

Among those on hand to honor her will be some of the students in her first class here—including Borough Assessor Bernard Marx, Mrs. Ruth Lange Cooney, wife of Councilman Alfred Cooney, and Ernest F. Blakely Jr. of Red Bank.

Like her present and more recent students, they speak of Miss Hamm with great devotion.

"She was always doing things for you, always giving you something, even if it was just a cookie," Mr. Blakely remembers.

Cooking Lesson

Mr. Marx said Miss Hamm gave him his first cooking lesson. It was preparation for a Halloween party, and she taught the class to make applesauce in the school kitchen.

Cities Condemnation

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Little Silver Project Is Attacked at Meeting

LITTLE SILVER — The county's \$160,000 road widening and traffic improvement project at the railroad station here came under attack last night.

In a repeat of his appearance at a meagerly attended public hearing here last February, Henry J. Ney, county traffic engineer, explained and defended the plan.

Objectors turned out at last night's Borough Council meeting apparently in response to a flyer warning commuters the project jeopardizes parking facilities and would prohibit stopping and standing on Branch Ave., adjacent to the station, where many wives now drop their commuting husbands off in the morning and

pick them up in the evening.

Ralph Santangelo of Sandy's Service Station, Branch Ave., an objector to the plan which will require condemnation of a portion of his property, said he had sent the flyers which bore no signature but the notation "Paid for by a Little Silver Taxpayer."

Concerned About Safety

Mr. Santangelo said he is concerned about the safety and convenience of persons living in the borough and those who use the railroad station here.

He suggested traffic problems in the area could be solved by installation of a traffic light, at least until the future location of the Red Bank passenger station is decided.

Most of the objections centered on the loss of parking at the station. Several in the audience warned that a lack of parking facilities would reduce the number of commuters boarding trains and might cause loss of the train stop.

Mayor Gordon N. Litvin declared the council is committed to finding ways of providing parking areas. He said discussions have been held with owners of property which might be used for parking. Mr. Ney said he has some ideas on how parking space might be provided, but he refused to disclose them last night because, he said, he hasn't had an opportunity to discuss them with the mayor and governing body.

The project, financed by state and county funds with a 10 per cent contribution from the borough, calls for widening Branch and Sycamore Aves. to four lanes in the station vicinity; construction of traffic islands at the throat of Willow Drive and Sycamore Ave. and on the northwest corner of Branch and Sycamore Aves.; and installation of traffic lights at the intersection of Branch and Sycamore Aves. and Branch Ave. and Ayres Lane. Willow Drive between Branch and Sycamore Aves. will be one-way northbound.

Mr. Ney noted the project, a decade in the planning, had been initiated at the request of the borough, which 18 months ago authorized acquisition of the necessary rights-of-way. He said the county submitted final specifications to the state Department of Transportation 10 days ago and is prepared to advertise for bids as soon as all easements are acquired.

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Connection Okay Asked

HAZLET — The Sewerage Authority last night asked the state for permission to connect the proposed Beers St. sewer system into the Raritan Valley USA Sewerage Co. plant.

This was one of the recommendations of an updated report on the Beers St. area by the authority's consulting engineer, H. Thomas Carr.

The report said the plan is feasible, but the design will have to be compatible with future regional sewerage requirements, and financing will have to be studied further.

The authority held the report for study.

No funds are available at present for construction of the Beers Street system.

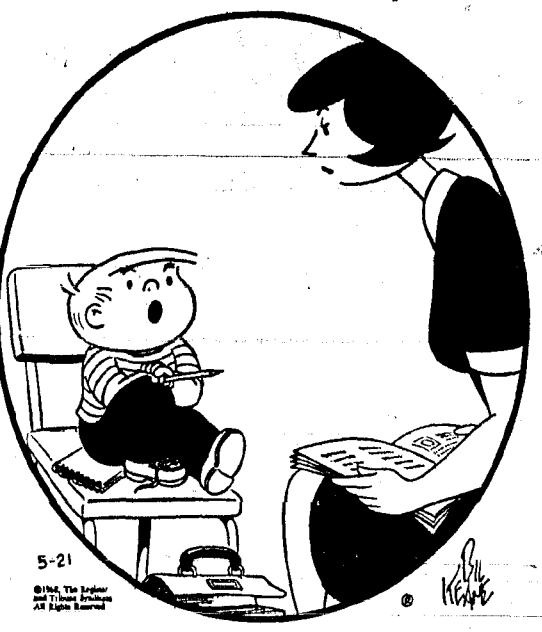

The NBC show, a mad rock-et-gun combination of outrageous gags and blackouts, won the award as best musical or variety series, and special. Laugh-in was presented as a special before taking to the air as a series in midseason.

The show's platoon of writers won Emmys for the best variety writing.

In the other major categories the awards had the look of a rerun. Repeat winners included: Lucille Ball, best actress-star in a comedy series; Don Adams of "Get Smart," best actor-star in a comedy series; Barbara Bain of "Mission Impossible," best actress-star in a dramatic series.

Best Performers
Other awards went to Maureen Stapleton, best actress in a single dramatic role, for "Among the Paths to Eden," Mervyn Douglas, best actor in

a single dramatic role, for "Do Not Go Gentle into That Good Night," best single dramatic program, "Elizabeth the Queen," Hallmark Hall of Fame; best comedy series, "Get Smart;" best supporting actress in a drama, Barbara Anderson, "Ironside;" best supporting actor in a comedy, Werner Klemperer, "Hogan's Heroes;" outstanding writing in drama, Loring Mandel, "Do Not Go Gentle into That Good Night."

Two of the supporting Emmies brought a sentimental reaction. The award for best supporting actress in a comedy went to Marion Lorne, the flirty witch of "Bewitched." She died two weeks ago at age 82.

Elizabeth Montgomery, star of "Bewitched," accepted the award for Miss Lorne and said, "We owe her a big thanks for all the happiness she brought us."

Milburn Stone, the "Doc" of the long-running "Gunsmoke," won heavy applause as best supporting actor in a drama.

Pair Are Cited
Two second bananas who approached starring status were cited for "outstanding individual achievement." Art Carney of "The Jackie Gleason Show" and Pat Paulsen of "The Smothers Brothers Comedy Hour."

A special board of trustees award went to Donald H. McGannon, president and board chairman of Group W, the Westinghouse Broadcasting Co. He was cited for public service, dynamic leadership, and "his early recognition of broadcasting's need to train and employ individuals from minority groups."

In contrast to the overlength Oscar show, the Emmy telecast ran an hour and 45 minutes. But the awards were deceptively profuse; there were 52 categories, and 10 writers claimed their Emmies for "Laugh-in." The show itself proved an embarrassment

to the television clan. The proceedings in New York often dissolved into chaos, with master of ceremonies Dick Van Dyke struggling to keep order.

Frank Sinatra, in Hollywood, had better luck. Other awards included:

Daytime programming achievement, "Today;" sports programming achievement, ABC's Wide World of Sports; and "Jim McKay;" dramatic direction achievement, Paul Bogart, "Dear Friends;" comedy direction, Bruce Bilson, "Get Smart;" music-variety direction, Jack Haley Jr., "Movin' With Nancy;" comedy writing, Allan Burns and Chris Hayward, "He and She."

Bridge Advice

By ALFRED SHEINWOLD

During the bidding you cannot count anything definite for such intermediate cards as tens and nines, but you should be aware of them. Bid a little more than you have them; a little less when you don't.

In today's hand South's invitational bid of three spades asks North: "Do you have good or poor values for what you have already bid? Go on to game if you have a better hand than I could reasonably expect."

In accepting the invitation, North is chiefly influenced by his two aces because an ace is worth slightly more than the 4 points you count for it when you value your hand according to the 4-3-2-1 point count. North is also influenced by the ten and nine of spades. Since North has no short suit, there is no real trump value in the North hand, but conceivably 10-9-3 of trumps is worth more than 4-3-2.

So it turns out in the play of this hand. South ruffs the third round of clubs with the jack of spades and immediately plays a low diamond from both hands, ducking the trick to East's nine of diamonds. East returns the king to declarer's queen, and South takes the ace of diamonds and ruffs a diamond with the king of trumps.

The point of the high ruffs is that South can now lead the eight of trumps to dummy's nine, and this enables him to ruff dummy's last diamond with the ace of trumps. South is out of trumps by this time, since he has ruffed three times and has led trumps twice.

Declarer leads a heart to dummy's ace and draws West's last trump with dummy's ten of trumps. Since declarer is out of trumps he discards a heart on dummy's ten of trumps and wins the last two tricks with the king and queen of hearts.

It takes this fine line of play to make the contract, but the play would be impossible if dummy had three low trumps instead of the 10-9-3.

DAILY QUESTION
Partner bids one spade, you respond 1-NT, and partner next bids two hearts. You hold: S-7 4 H-J 9 7 4 D-K J 9 C-Q 10 9 4. What do you say?
Answer: Bid three hearts. This is an overbid, but it is a poor idea to pass when you have 4-card trump support for partner's major suit. Your partner must be careful to pass at three hearts if he has a minimum opening bid since you would jump to four hearts if you had any real strength.

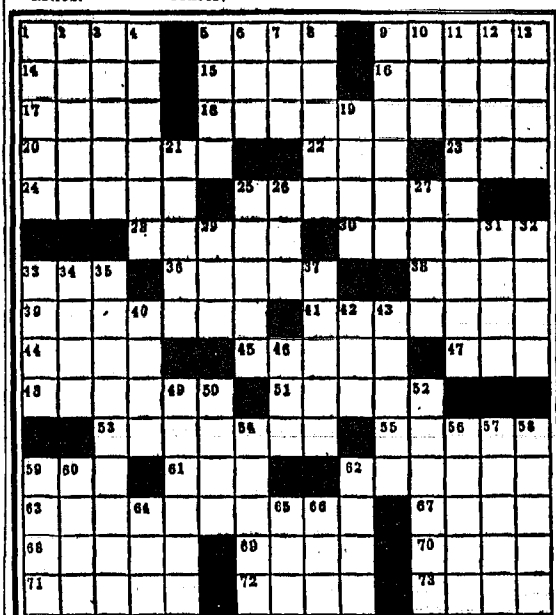
